The premise is straightforward: we will not reach our goals for undergraduate student success and for quality of learning and educational experience without fostering curricular/co-curricular integration. Seamless integration requires effective collaboration within and between units, including but not limited to academic affairs, student affairs, enrollment management, diversity/inclusion/equity, and institutional research. Effective collaboration requires mutual understanding and mutual respect. The last, alas, is not always as robust as it could be. We struggle to achieve community across silos, horizontal collaboration across vertical reporting structures. Our panelists will offer short provocations to stimulate what we hope will be candid conversation about how best to work toward effective collaboration that supports curricular/co-curricular integration and that, if carried out in a leadership culture of mutual understanding and respect, would strengthen a student-centered research university.

Arboretum Walking Tour

The UC Davis Arboretum is a nationally recognized public garden as well as a teaching facility.
This gentle walk will take you through a coastal redwood grove, a native California garden, and plants from all over the world including the Mediterranean, Australia, and China. It is also home to wildlife including turtles, ducks, egrets, otters, opossums and more.



Department of Animal Science Horse Barn

The Horse Barn has been a campus mainstay since the early 1910s. Originally a carriage house for draft horses and mules used in the university's agricultural work, it has served as a remount station for the US Army and a successful Thoroughbred breeding operation. The Horse Barn educates our students about all aspects of equine reproduction management via hands-on experience, and relies heavily on student involvement to keep it running.



Goat Teaching & Research Facility

Sure, you love goats. But do you know the difference between Saanen and La Mancha breeds? Or how to milk a goat? Our Goat Barn is home to about 150 goats representing a dairy herd, meat herd, and a transgenic research herd. The facility offers weekly management classes and goat management internships and volunteer opportunities to about 100 students a year.

The RMI is home to the university's winemaking, brewing, and food science programs and their facilities. Home to the campus vineyard, Good Life Garden, Olive Center, and numerous labs, the institute provides the Departments of Viticulture and Enology, and Food Science and Technology a prestigious forum for collaboration and outreach, built around the central mission of enhancing public understanding of wine, brewing, and food sciences.



The Undergraduate Coffee Lab

Class Observation with Professors Bill Ristenpart and Tonya Kuhl

The Coffee Lab is a unique teaching space designed for undergraduates. More than 1,500 students each year enroll in ECH 1, *The Design of Coffee*. The only engineering course available to students in any major, it is one of our most popular GE courses, and originated as a University Honors Program seminar. Class will be in session during the tour, so registration is limited.



The Molecular Prototyping and BioInnovation Lab (MPBIL)

Led by Biomedical Engineering Professor Marc Faccioti and Lab Manager Andrew Yao The MPBIL hosts experiential learning activities in biotechnology and biodesign, including first year seminars, upper-division specialty courses, the iGEM and BioDesign Challenge teams, capstone design teams, student entrepreneurs, and multidisciplinary project teams organized through the student-led BioInnovation Group. The MPBIL is a one-of-a-kind nucleus for student-driven creative work and laboratory for institutional change.
